At Silverstone there was also the first opportunity to get up close to the new MG Cyberster as it was on display to the public for the first time with the camouflage removed, I believe that it will also be at the forthcoming Goodwood Festival of Speed, it is good that 100 years on from launch it is still possible to buy a new car bearing the MG badge,

yself and Graham Risdon took ourselves off to Castle Combe on 5th June to join the MGs On Track. The morning started off a little bit chillsome, but by the afternoon I was certainly glad to be one of the cars without a roof!

Apparently the track record speed is 153mph, set by a McLaren 650S Spider. Following on from our visit I can confirm that this record just about stands still. Regretfully myself and Graham could not crack the 152mph barrier - although I'm pleased to report that I did make it into the three figure territory approaching Quarry before I decided that some liberal application of the middle pedal would be required in order to continue my existence on this Earth.

Graham was suffering a misfiring problem early on, something that his doctor had been unable to sort. Fortunately the MG camaraderie which we are blessed to experience with these cars came to the rescue in the shape of another driver who was following Graham on the track. He came over to see if everything was ok, before proceeding to pull out a spare set of plugs, spare leads, and a few other odds and ends from his car. Turns out that his profession was Classic Car Mechanic - how handy was that! Unfortunately he is booked up for 6 months and came from West Wales. The first people I chatted to had come all the way from Suffolk, and another couple had come from a road two cul-de-sacs away from my house!

We thoroughly recommend these days to you all. You get plenty of track time, I recorded 100 miles of circuit driving. You can also pay for additional instruction which I certainly benefited from. It is very laid back and respectful, all of the drivers are there to see what they can do with their own car and there is no racing. Slower drivers will move to let you past and faster drivers will hold back until you are comfortable to move over. The

maximum number on the track at any one time is 12 cars so plenty of space across a 1.85mile circuit.

The next Castle Combe session is in September, but they travel across the country if you wish to travel further afield. Graham has tried a few other circuits.

The Prescott Historique

hilst the club was motoring up to the British Motor Museum at Gaydon as part of the MG Centenary Celebrations on the 27th May, I took myself off on a wonderfully sunny day to Prescott for the Prescott Historique. The event was a celebration of 90 years of hill climbing at Prescott, with a magnificent selection of cars representing that period.

In addition to the 120 competing cars, BRM brought along their famous V16 BRM which took to the hill either side of the lunch break. Also as a nod to Raymond Mays who established the BRM project after the war, there were a number of ERAs representing the company he also set up in the early thirties and successfully competed against the continental factories of the likes of Maserati and Gordini.

Part of the joy of going to Prescott is being able to park in the orchard alongside what amounts to a history of the motor car. To be able to walk amongst great cars from the past and talk to other like minded enthusiasts is a joy. Once you have dragged yourself away from the magnificent selection of cars, its a short walk over the bridge and onto the circuit- and yet more fabulous machinery. As I've said 120 competing cars representing amongst others Alfa Romeo, Jaguar, Elva, Alpine, Lotus, Ginetta, Riley, Frazer Nash, Morgan, Austin Healey, ERA the list is endless and of course at the home of the Bugatti Owners Club parked on the Bugatti Terrace a dozen or so competing pre-war Bugattis.

Now, one of the highlights for me was a couple of MG J2s - see the title photo. I included the J2 and its racing version the famous J4 in my talk to the club pre COVID. As you probably know Cecil Kimber the genius behind MG was a great believer in "racing improves the breed". Despite the post Great Depression period and the economically

gloomy outlook for 1932 MG launched the J2. A complete departure from the successful M-type Midget although the lessons learnt from racing the Midget in the hands of Freddie March - Goodwood's current Duke of Richmond's grandfather - was carried over onto the J2. A new era of great MGs - long bonnet, cut-away door sides, cycle wings and a large slab fuel tank with spare wheel strapped behind had arrived. All copied by Singer, Wolseley, HRG and Aston Martin. I could go on, but I should stop there!



All set for the MG100 at Gaydon. Campsite booked for the weekend and route mapped along the Fosseway.

Lovely weather, not too much traffic and looking good for the weekend until DISASTER struck. Luckily we had the motorhome with somewhere to sit and have lunch.

Next a white van pulled in asking if we needed any help. The guy was an NHS nurse who also had V8 MGB, we said we were waiting for the AA and he also gave his name and number.

The AA kept us up to date by text and they arrived in just over an hour.

He was a youngish chap but luckily had an interest in Classics as he owned a Fiesta XR2.

He soon noticed a hairline crack on the oil pump and tried a temporary repair with JB weld which he thought might get us to Gaydon but we then couldn't be relayed home if it failed again.

The engine started with no knocks or rattles but the oil was still leaking and so he said we would need a home recovery. Luckily he couldn't put us on the dolly as the car has been lowered and his "computer said NO". We then had to wait for a total lift recovery which he said could be anything up to four hours.

In the event, the truck arrived within two hours, loaded the MG and set off for home. Interesting chat on the way, as the AA driver owned 6 classics including army trucks and a rare Australian "ute". What an eventful and disappointing day, but the biggest let down was that not a single MG stopped to see if we were OK and there were plenty on their way to Gaydon!!!!

We eventually made it there the next day -powered by Ford- via the Motorway.

This week, I had an email from the AA saying in April alone; they had more than 52000 callouts for cars damaged by potholes!!!
