SEPTEMBER CLUB NIGHT Presentation by Tom Strickland

Major-General Eugene Vincent Michael Strickland rose from penniless hardship to great military distinction. He was a tank man, a war hero who fought in France, North Africa and Italy during the Second World War, and whose name is revered even today in the regiments that he commanded.

In May 1940, he played a major part in the counterattack at Arras, where two British infantry tank battalions held up the German advance for three days, enabling the success of the Dunkirk evacuation – and perhaps saving Britain from ultimate defeat in the process.



uring the 1973 Arab-Israeli War, Arab members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) imposed an embargo against the United States in retaliation for the U.S. decision to re-supply the Israeli military and to gain leverage in the post-war peace negotiations. As the crisis took hold, global oil prices quadrupled, and this had a direct and dramatic effect on petrol prices at the pump. By the end of the crisis, UK petrol prices had roughly doubled. By 1974, the price per litre was somewhere between 11 pence and 15 pence.



When the Unexpected Happens

ack in July Priscilla and I headed off to France in our Ford Mondeo with the caravan on the back for a couple of weeks in the company of our granddaughter and daughter who were travelling separately in their Discovery. All went well apart from their managing to miss the Portsmouth - Ouistreham ferry because of a traffic hold up. But we were all united at our delightful site in the Vendee and spent a happy week doing things for a five year old: our mini-golf skills improved no end and we are now experts at bouncy castle supervision.

After a week we decamped and headed south for our second site in the Dordogne with the caravan in tow. Priscilla was driving and we were heading towards Bordeaux on a lovely sunny day. We became aware that a Mini in front of us was being driven in a most erratic way - it was zooming off into the distance and then slowing down whilst all the time weaving erratically from side to side. Overtaking with the caravan on the back needs a bit of care at the best of times. We like to stick to approximately the UK limit of around 90 kph and nipping past didn't seem either possible or sensible.

At this point the Mini swerved left, clouted a van and then sharply veered right - so much so that it left the autoroute and shot up the angled grassy bank at the side. After a hundred yards or so it rolled onto its roof and then cartwheeled end to end down the bank and onto the slow lane where it landed on its roof just in front of us. Priscilla very wisely had been keeping her distance and was easily able to stop: we just hoped that the vehicles behind us had left enough braking distance - fortunately they had!

In fact several other vehicles stopped as well and a group of five or so burly young gentleman ran over to the car and began to rescue the occupant - as it turned out there was only one who was hanging upside-down in her seat belt - an elderly lady of about eighty.

Priscilla and I hastily donned our regulation hi -vis jackets. I grabbed our warning triangles and, feeling somewhat vulnerable, set off up the slow lane to place our warning triangles so that the rear of the caravan didn't get clouted.

The lady was rescued with just one tiny cut on her wrist - she was understandably dazed, could hardly speak and was clueless as to what had happened. Our main thought was to get her to safety in one of the parked vehicles so that she didn't wander off into the traffic. The pompiers and agents soon arrived and noticed half a dozen or so bottles of wine rolling around in the upturned car - maybe she had just been shopping!

We will never know what caused this to happen. We gave our details to the police but having taken the briefest of statements they didn't seem interested so I assume that under French law they had all the evidence that they needed. In fact once they had ascertained that nobody was injured, they became quite jovial and were very impressed that we had followed the letter of the law with our hi vis jackets and triangles.

I guess that all of us have witnessed poor driving in front of us and of course it usually doesn't lead to anything - but in this case it did and keeping well back from the Mini certainly saved us from what could have been a nasty collision. I'm pleased to report that the rest of the trip went smoothly, although I think that a couple of glasses of red wine at our Dordogne campsite that evening had a pleasingly calming influence.


